


Does your child have autism?

SERVICES FOR MEDICAID-ELIGIBLE CHILDREN WITH AUTISM

Intensive Care Coordination



A care manager works directly with you and your child, coordinates a child and family team, and prepares and monitors a service plan to meet your child's behavioral health needs, coordinating with all needed medical, social, educational and other services.

Behavioral Support



A behavioral therapist develops and monitors a positive behavioral management plan and may supervise and coordinate with other trained personnel to implement the plan. A behavioral support team provides crisis services.

Therapeutic Mentoring

A therapeutic mentor helps your child learn age-appropriate behaviors, coaches your child to help improve communication and problem-solving skills, and supports your child to learn how to relate appropriately to other children and to adults.



Youth and Family Peers

Certified peer specialists help you and your child access services, navigate child-serving systems, and build and maintain community living skills. Family peers are family members of persons with autism while youth peers are young adults with autism.



In-Home Therapy



Therapy provided by a licensed clinician to your child to address your child's behavioral and mental health needs. This service helps your family support your child to improve functioning in the home and community.

Psychoeducational Services



Training and education to help you understand the nature of your child's disability and how to help your child be meaningfully engaged in your community.
